So we have now handed all litter responsibilities back to Wyre forest. Any litter seen on the roadside needs reporting on the council HUB. Or on the **"love clean streets"** phone app.

Over the next few months after several near misses, I am planning to undertake a road side tree safety survey, this will be published and tree owners notified of dangerous trees.

A great loss to the Parish Council and the parish this year, is Carole Gammond stepping down after 45 years volunteering as a councillor, we hope to continue to call on her depth of knowledge and understanding of local issues and wish her all the best.

Summer Security



Here are some simple but effective ways that you can protect your property during summer months:

- Keep front, patio and back doors closed and locked when you are elsewhere in the house or the garden.
- Keep garden gates locked when you are away from the property.
- Ensure that windows and external doors on the ground floor are locked at night, and all doors and windows are locked when you are out of the house. Even a small window could provide a burglar with an opportunity to reach through and open a larger window to gain access.
- Remember to close downstairs windows when leaving a room, to deter the opportunist thief.
- Find out about property marking schemes such as **Smartwater** If an item is marked it will be much harder for a thief to sell on. Also, if recovered, stolen items can then be returned to their rightful owner.
- Look out for your neighbours' property if they are away for a few days.
- Joining your local Neighbourhood Watch Scheme is good way to meet those living on your street. Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators help to keep the local groups informed of criminal activity in the community, pass on crime prevention advice and help resolve local issues. Local members are encouraged to keep an eye on what's going and pass on details of suspicious activity. We have a local watch scheme, operated via email contact. Planning

Have your say on planning in Worcestershire? The planning consultation database for the County is being refreshed and Worcestershire County Council would like to invite residents and businesses to register so that they can have their say on planning matters. The Council plays a significant planning role across the whole of Worcestershire including policies and strategies about minerals and waste and major infrastructure projects like new railway stations and bridges. Councillor Marc Bayliss, Worcestershire County Councillor with Responsibility for Economy Infrastructure and Skills, said: "Community engagement plays a vital role in the way we make our plans, and I cordially invite residents and businesses to register to participate and influence this process. Our work includes developing important strategies relating to ecology and biodiversity that make Worcestershire distinct and special, as well as planning for infrastructure such as schools and highway projects. This is a great way for people to hear about what is going on and get involved in the planning work we do." <u>Note</u> Wyre Forest District Council is the local planning authority dealing with planning permission relating to changes to property and building in the District.

Worcestershire County Council's planning role includes policies and strategies about minerals and waste and major infrastructure projects like new schools, railway stations and bridges etc., not to be confused with the District Council's role.

Roadside Wall repaired

After a report by a local resident that this wall on the corner of Eymore Lane and School Lane was in bad repair, the Parish Council, supported by County Cllr. Ian Hardiman reported the matter to the highways team at the County Council, and repairs were carried out.



Garden Bonfires—a hot topic

Technically, most garden bonfires aren't actually illegal. However, there are laws in place for the nuisance they can cause. The Parish Council have no authority to intervene on the problem these may cause, but excessive fires and the burning of illegal matter may be reported by those affected to Worcester Regulatory Services, who have offices at Wyre Forest District Council. Burning domestic waste is strictly prohibited, as it may cause pollution or harm people's health. Excessive household or garden waste may be suitable for recycling or composting, and consideration should be given to taking this by car to be disposed of at Worcester Road, Kidderminster Waste Depot, or at the Stourport Road depot.

Also, there is no set time limit on having a bonfire, but there are times when it's more polite to have one - such as early morning or late evening, when you're least likely to annoy your neighbours. A quick, hot fire also reduces smoke emissions. Crucially, you have to make sure that the smoke from your bonfire doesn't blow across a road and cause danger to the traffic on it. Burning green leaves and vegetation also creates much more smoke, so we would recommend using the green waste disposal and recycling facilities at the council waste depots. You should ideally only ever burn dry materials, and tell your neighbours in advance.

In the hot summer months, please try to keep outdoor fires to a minimum—both in size and frequency. Local neighbours may have washing out, and windows open in summer months, and in the interests of good neighbourly relations, it is polite to keep fires to a minimum at these times. It is also the time when vegetation is at its driest, and so, fires could be hazardous, and quickly get out of control in such dry conditions. So, if having a bonfire, or barbecue in the coming months, please give a thought to neighbours and how it might affect them, and never leave it unattended.
